

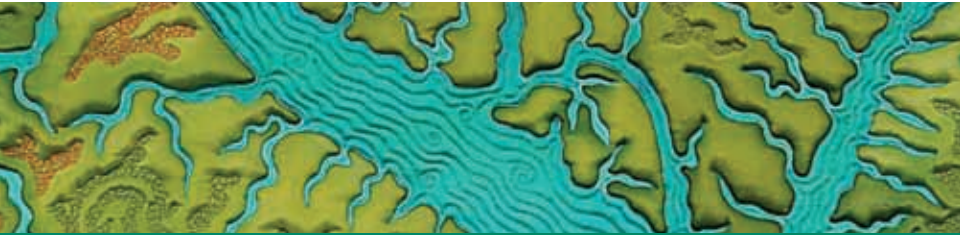

## Green: the Color and the Cause

April 16-September 11, 2011

Many cultures traditionally associate the color green with nature and its attributes, including life, fertility and rebirth. In recent years, green has become the symbolic color of environmentalism. This exhibition will celebrate green as both a color and as a cause, exploring the techniques people have devised to create green textiles, the meanings this color has held in cultures across time and place, and the ways that contemporary textile artists are responding to concerns about the environment.

Throughout the world, textiles were historically so valuable that threadbare fabrics were seldom completely discarded. Second Lives will highlight the ways people in various cultures have ingeniously repurposed worn but precious fabrics to create beautiful new textile forms.
